You referred to a thesis entitled "Wagons of War: A History of 10 Transport Company 1951-2011" by Grant Morris (Massey University, 2012, and you requested the following:

- 1. I would like to request a copy of the RNZALR History Book pdf document so that I can check the validity of Morris' claim as it stands in stark contrast to the NZDF's position on this matter.
- 2. Even if the term "The Duke of York's Own" is only an informal term, does the NZDF have any intentions to discontinue its use, given it currently appears throughout the NZDF website...

The 'History of the New Zealand Logistic Regiment' is enclosed. The New Zealand Defence Force has removed, and continues to remove, references to the term "The Duke of York's Own".

1. History of the New Zealand Logistic Regiment

HISTORY OF THE NEW ZEALAND LOGISTIC REGIMENT

Formation

- 1. In 1992, as part of Army Rebalance, the logistic function in the NZ Army began to combine. The Regional Support Units were replaced with Logistic Regiments, and the individual CSS Schools were replaced with Trade Training School (TTS) and Log Ops School. To complete the evolution towards integrated logistics for the NZ Army, a study team was commissioned to examine and report on how the integration of RNZCT, RNZAOC, and RNZEME functions could best be achieved.
- 2. As a result of the study, Chief of General Staff, Major General P M Reid (CGS) outlined how the move towards integrated logistic function in the NZ Army was to be achieved. CGS signed the directive 07/96 dated 4 Apr 96 to form the New Zealand Logistic Regiment. This directive also established two committees. A Logistics Organisation Committee (LOC) and a Regimental Matters Committee (RMC). Both committees were issued Terms of Reference to examine in detail the organisational and regimental requirements for the NZLR. The formation of the NZLR was identified as 4 Dec 96.

Structure

- 3. The NZLR structure consisted of Four Logistic Battalions, a Base Logistics Group, a Force Support Group and a Movements Company. The following units were then identified:
 - a. 2nd Logistic Regiment (Linton Region),
 - b. 3rd Logistic Regiment (Burnham Region),
 - c. 4th Logistic Regiment (Waiouru Region),
 - d. 5th Logistic Regiment (Wellington Region),
 - e. 5th Base Logistic Group (Wellington Region),
 - f. 1st Logistic Company (Mt Wellington Barracks),
 - g. 5th Force Support Company (Auckland Region), and
 - h. 5th Movement Squadron (Hobsonville).

Personnel

- 4. 2111 military personnel were affected by the forming of NZLR. These are as follows:
 - a. All Regular and Territorial Force personnel whose parent Corps is RNZCT, RNZAOC and RNZEME are to change to NZLR irrespective of their present employment, which may or may not be in a Logistic unit.
 - b. Storeman All Arms. The trades of Storeman All Arms and Supplier are to be combined to form Supplier/Quartermaster.

- 5. It became apparent that personnel affected by the formation were concerned with the title of New Zealand Logistic Regiment. This concern was raised at a RMC meeting and it was decided that two further names be considered for the title of the new Regiment. These being:
 - a. New Zealand Army Logistic Regiment (NZALR); and
 - b. Royal New Zealand Army Logistic Regiment (RNZALR).
- 6. The title NZALR was only considered as a second option if the preferred option of RNZALR was not approved before the formation date of 4 Dec 96. Her Majesty the Queen signed her approval for the grant of the title **ROYAL NEW ZEALAND ARMY LOGISTIC REGIMENT (RNZALR)** for 9 Dec 96. This date signified the official disbandment of RNZCT, RNZAOC and RNZEME and the formation of RNZALR.

Disbandment Parades

- 7. The final parade for RNZCT, RNZAOC and RNZEME was conducted on 9 Dec 96. The **format** consisted of each Corps marching on as individual Corps, marching past as their individual Corps flags were being lowered for the last time and marching off the parade ground for the final time.
- 8. The soldiers removed all Corps identity, reformed in the new dress and under its new command marched onto the parade ground as the **Royal New Zealand Army Logistic Regiment**. CGS directive 07/96 to form the RNZALR was implemented. Regions who conducted formation parades were as follows:

Colonel in Chief

- 9. The appointment of His Royal Highness Prince Andrew, Duke of York as Colonel in Chief of the Regiment was approved by Her Majesty the Queen on 9 Dec 96.
- 10. Enclosed is a letter from Buckingham Palace from Capt N Blair, LVO, Royal Navy to Col J R Bright, MBE who held the appointment of Regimental Colonel, RNZALR. in 1997.

Thank you so much for your letter of 13th January. It is excellent to be in touch and within the near future I shall write again in an attempt to provide you with all the information you require for the Colonel-in-Chief's Banner for the Royal New Zealand Army Logistic Regiment.

My prime purpose in writing to you now is not only to acknowledge your letter but to say that at present we have no knowledge here of an invitation for His Royal Highness to visit New Zealand in April 1997. His Royal Highness of course is immensely keen to meet his new regiment in New Zealand and wondered if perhaps November might be a suitable time. I shall take this up with Brigadier Leighs, to whom I have also written and at the same time and mentioned that His Royal Highness hopes very much to see him when he visits London between 22nd and 24th May.

On a personal note may I say that I much look forward to being in touch again and to taking part in the arrangements for a forthcoming visit.

Regiment Flag

The RNZALR flag is 180cm x 90cm. The Regimental badge is positioned centrally on a blue field (PMS 274B) with an edge of silver (PMS 877). The logistic battalion flags are identified in design and colour except that each battalion is distinguished by a coloured identifier with the battalion number situated in the dexter canton part of the flag.

12. Over 110 designs were considered during the selection process. Many failed to meet the very stringent design criteria by the Herald of Arms or were too similar to badges which already existed.

13. The badge that was finally selected for RNZALR features a Southern Cross on an oval device. The Southern Cross was selected as it is a recognised New Zealand identifier and was used by 2NZEF to identify non divisional unit vehicles, primarily logistics, in 1942 at Maadi. It was again adopted as the Logistic Support Group identifier and it reappears in the Headquarters Support Command identifier. The Green fern is also unique to New Zealand and the crossed swords represents Army. The Crown located at the peak of the badge represents our ties with the Monarch and the bottom inscription scroll is the title of the Regiment. The badge/crest will feature as the centre piece on the Regiment Flag, hat badge, collar badges and Regimental belt buckle.

Note: The official painting of the badge is held at Trade Training School (TTS) Trentham.

Regimental Birthday

14. As stated at para 2, CGS signed the directive on 4 Apr 96. This day marks the occasion when RNZALR celebrates its Regimental Birthday. The first Regimental Birthday was celebrated on 4 Apr 97. It is important that all soldiers of the Regiment understand why RNZALR celebrate selected customs and traditions. The former selected and the reasons why the Regiment celebrates these customs is as follows:

a.	0616 hrs	Fire a Cannon
b.		Chaplain or appropriate person
c.		Reading of Regiment Collect (read by the youngest RNZALR soldier on parade)
d.		Script read about our Patron Saint, St Stephen (read by the Camp Chaplain or appropriate)
e.		Breakfast (cutting of the Regiment cake)
f.		Regional activities

15. The reasons why RNZALR members celebrate the Regimental Birthday in this format are as follows:

a. Firing the Cannon

Compiled by WO1 S Patterson, RSM, 5 FSC RNZALR

(1) Since 1960 RNZEME have fired a Cannon to mark the start of its Corps Birthday. The Cannon is situated at Trentham Military Camp and protects the gateway to 1st Base Logistic Battalion. RNZAOC Coat of Arms and Cap badge show three Cannons and three Cannon balls with the Coat of Arms showing two Cyclops supporting the shield. These were one-eyed artisans. The artisans were indeed artificers who were the repairers of such equipment. The Cannons of the day were horse drawn and required ammunition wagons called limbers to accompany them into battle. The Cannon was considered the key to dominating the battlefield, the requirement to use large amounts of ammunition became a logistic nightmare. To resolve this problem, special units were formed to administer, control, procure, deliver and repair the logistic requirement of a battlefield and an Army at war. Part of this was the Wagon Train. Therefore RNZALR will continue this tradition as a mark of respect for the close ties that RNZCT, RNZAOC and RNZEME once shared. Timings have been altered as traditionally it was fired at 0600hrs.

b. Procedure

(1) This tradition will be conducted in each region by a Cannon/Gun being fired at 0616 hrs to mark the start of RNZALR Birthday.

(2) At the completion of firing the Cannon the youngest RNZALR soldier on parade will read the Regiment Collect.

c. Regiment Collect/Prayer

Compiled by Padre Kevey, Trentham Camp Chaplain and WO1 P H Hokianga, RSM, 1 Base Log Bn, RNZALR.

(1) Extracts from RNZCT, RNZAOC and RNZEME Corps collect were amalgamated to form what is the RNZALR Regiment Collect.

Grant to we who are in the Royal New Zealand Army Logistic Regiment strength, courage and wisdom to serve both you and others in the monotony of routine and in the excitement of danger. Uphold us in our efforts to offer provisions and supplies, maintenance and repairs, transport and movements, and sustenance to those whom we serve. May we always be faithful in our duty, and ready for whatever comes.

d. Procedure

(1) At the completion of the reading of our Regiment Collect the Padre or appropriate person will read the script about our Patron Saint, St Stephen.

e. Patron Saint (St Stephen)

Compiled by Padre L Kevey, Trentham Camp Chaplain

PATRON SAINT ST STEPHEN

Stephen was the first Deacon or servant of The Church. He was also one of the seven appointed by Apostles to serve tables in Jerusalem (see Acts 6). He took part in preaching and "performed" many miracles. It was these miracles which set Stephen off-side with orthodox Jews. He was arrested and taken before the Sanhedrin (which was the Supreme Council and the highest Court of Justice). Whilst before this Court, Stephen defended himself vigorously and managed to so infuriate his listeners that they had him stoned without a formal trial. He died confessing to Christ and so became the Church's first Martyr; the date of his death is around the year AD35.

St Stephen is well suited to being the Logistic Regiment Patron because:

- (1) he began his Christian work as a Deacon or Servant; the Logistic Regiment is also a servant, to other elements of the New Zealand Army;
- (2) he became involved in the work of the Church, preaching and carrying out miracles. The Logistic Regiment also becomes involved with the wider work of the New Zealand Army; and
- (3) St Stephen is thus an on-going example for we who are Members of the Royal New Zealand Army Logistic Regiment.


f. Regiment Breakfast

Compiled by WO1 S Thomas, RSM, 4 Log Bn RNZALR

- (1) RNZALR will host a Regional Regimental breakfast. This will include a toast to the Regiment and the cutting of the Regimental Birthday cake. The following customs are detailed:
 - (a) Regimental Toast. The serving of Port and coffee is a RNZALR custom, which is to be observed at the Regimental breakfast. Port has been chosen as the Regimental Drink as it has more significance to military personnel, being that it is the traditional drink used to toast at formal functions and in remembrance of fallen comrades. The Port may be consumed on its own, or with the coffee in the same way as rum is on ANZAC Day.

g. Procedure

(1) The Senior Officer selected is to stand and raise his/her glass and propose a toast.

h. Regimental Cake

(1) The Regimental Birthday cake is produced by the RNZALR catering service and will be presented at breakfast for cutting. The cake will be a design similar to the Regiment Flag; however, the catering staff may alter the design to suit the occasion.

i. Procedure

(1) A Regiment birthday cake will be presented to the Commanding Officer and Regimental Sergeant Major of the Battalion/Unit at breakfast. They will receive an Infantry Sword from the Regiment Duty Officer and the CO and RSM of the hosting Bn/Unit will cut the cake. At the conclusion of the cutting of the cake final speeches may be made and this will end the formal part of the Regimental Birthday.

j. Formal Parade

(1) A formal parade will be conducted in each region once every five years. The formal parade format will conform to NZP6A. The Reviewing Officer for the formal parade is the Colonel of the Regiment or in his absence the Regimental Colonel. This will give each region an opportunity to host the RO in their region. The following Battalions/Units are to host the RO in their region. These are as follows:

(a) 4 Apr 97	Trentham
(b) 4 Apr 98	Linton
(c) 4 Apr 99	Burnham
(d) 4 Apr 00	Waiouru
(e) 4 Apr 01	Auckland
(f) 4 Apr 02	Trentham

(2) Battalions/Units not hosting the Colonel of the Regiment or Regimental Colonel are to observe the formal procedures as detailed in para 14. The chance to parade all RNZALR personnel in each region en mass to celebrate the Regimental Birthday will further enhance the spirit, customs and traditions of the Regiment.

Regimental Duty Officer and Duty Sergeant

- 16. RNZALR on a regional basis will appoint a Junior Officer and Junior Senior Non Commissioned Officer as the Regimental Duty Officer/Sergeant for the day. They are responsible to the hosting unit CO and RSM for the maintenance of RNZALR customs, traditions and conduct of the days activities. They are to carry out the following procedures:
 - a. Dress:
 - (1) Dress 1A, Service Dress, Full Ceremonial with Sword.
 - b. Responsibilities:
 - (1) break the Regimental Flag at 0616 hrs;
 - (2) assist with all presentations;
 - (3) present a Sword to the CO/RSM for cutting of the Regiment birthday cake at breakfast;
 - (4) ensure conduct and safety of soldiers throughout the day's activities is monitored; and
 - (5) lower the Regimental Flag at 1645 hrs.

Motto

17. Four different Mottos were discussed to support RNZALR. The Motto selected is:

MA NGA HUA TU-TANGATA (By Our Actions we are Known)

RNZALR SERVICE SCROLL

- 19. RNZALR (RMC) has approved the issue of a twenty year service scroll for both regular and territorial force soldiers who have completed 20 years service and are currently employed or retiring from RNZALR.
- 20. The scroll is printed on 120gsm gold shaded paper and bears the Regiment Crest. The scroll is authorised by the Colonel of the Regiment and Regimental Colonel and is numbered from 0001. The first scroll produced is held at Trade Training School (TTS) in Trentham.
- 21. MCM branch (AGS) Trentham is responsible for the administration and issue of the RNZALR 20 year scrolls.

Disbandment of 1st Base Logistic Battalion

- 22. In 1995 CGS directed a Defence Rationalisation Review with emphasis being placed on the operational focus of the NZ Army. Depot engineering and warehousing support was deemed non corps business and not critical for soldier development. It was also projected that a commercial operator could provide a more cost-effective output for the Army.
- 23. Therefore, on 30 Jan 98 1st Base Logistic Battalion lowered it's flag for the last time and the unit disbanded. The keys to the gates were then passed to Serco Project Engineering Limited, who commenced depot engineering and warehousing support to the NZ Army on 2 Feb 98.

Disbandment of 5th Movements Company

24. On 31 Dec 98 yet another logistics unit came under the Defence Rationalisation Review. 5th Movements Company at Hobsonville was disbanded and relocated to Linton Camp. 11 Jan 99 marked the day that 5 Mov Coy was integrated into 10 Transport Company, with the amalgamation of the two companies which now form 10 Transport and Movements Company.

The Prince Andrew Banner

25. The Prince Andrew Banner was presented by the Colonel in Chief, Royal New Zealand Logistic Regiment, His Royal Highness Prince Andrew and is known as The Prince Andrew Banner. The Prince Andrew Banner was received into the Regiment and consecrated on 16 Nov 98 in Palmerston North. The Prince Andrew Banner is an outward sign of the Regiment's heritage, an acknowledgement of the important role it performs today, and the role it's predecessors performed with courage and resilience in the past. The Banner represents the focal point for the traditions, loyalty and spirit of the Royal New Zealand Army Logistic Regiment.
